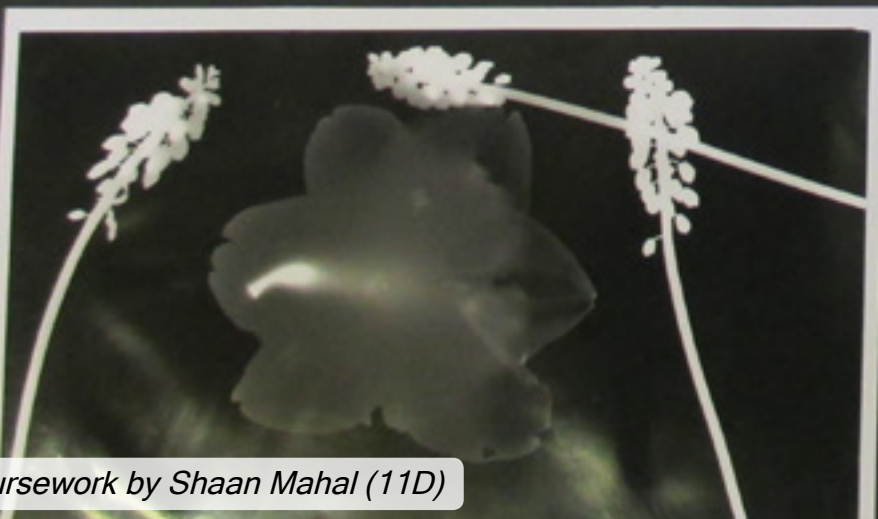

## SUN PRINTS

These are my sun prints of natural objects. I have produced sun prints on natural things such as flowers, feathers, berries, leaves and dandelions. To make these sun prints, I first used photographic paper. I used photographic paper as it is very sensitive to light exposure. I arranged objects on the photographic paper and I then applied pressure on the objects by using a glass cover. The glass cover kept the objects in place so that the sun could produce a photograph (sun print). I left the sun to shine on the photographic paper for around half an hour for both of these sun prints. After that I washed the photographic paper using a bowl of water to wash away any chemicals on the paper. I then left the paper to dry on a washing line until it was dry and it produced an image.



I really like the sun prints I have produced for a number of reasons. The sun print on the top is very interesting. I can tell that the leaves were much thicker than the dandelions as the leaves have a bold, solid shape. The leaves have no shadows which shows that the leaves perhaps needed more light exposure. On the other hand, I like the contrast in shapes and shades. The dandelions have an interesting shape, which I really like. The shadows make the sun print more engaging and attractive to look at. Unfortunately, I placed the berries on top of the leaves and because of the thickness, the photographic paper was not able to identify the berries. Perhaps more light exposure would have distinguished the objects better. However, my favourite sun print is the one on the bottom with just the feathers. I like this one better than the other one because of its simplicity. The feathers have an unbelievable amount of detail in certain areas which makes the sun print interesting and compelling. I like how the feathers seem to fade into the background to give a more meaningful, attractive photograph. I decided to do these sun prints as I wanted to develop on from the photograms and try a different technique but still keeping to Man Ray's style. It is similar to Man Ray's style because of the composition of the pieces. I have produced simplistic sun prints with different objects overlapping each other.





## A Message from the Headteacher

### SCHOOL PERFORMANCE TABLES

The recently published School Performance Tables demonstrate how well the students at Isleworth & Syon School performed in last summer's examinations. The data compares our students with girls and boys across England.

Progress 8 - this measures the progress from Key Stage 2 (end of primary) to Key Stage 4 (GCSE) for the cohort of students. This is the key measure of school performance used to judge school performance.

Our measure of +0.46 is statistically "significantly above national average", which is set at 0.00, and places us in the top 14% of all schools. We cannot make direct comparisons with boys' only results only at this stage. However, nationally boys are scoring -0.24. We therefore confidently expect our measure to be in the top 5% of results nationally, for boys.

Results across the board are similarly impressive and again we look forward to being able to compare our results against boys only.

### DATA PROTECTION

From 25 May 2018, new regulations have been introduced which affects how our school handles peoples' data. This is called the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR).

Compliance with the regulation will be an ongoing process; the school has appointed a Data Protection Officer (DPO) to advise and manage compliance with the regulation. Full details of our DPO will be available on the school website soon.

We will be publicising policies, procedures and notices that are compliant with the new regulations in the coming months and will keep you informed of any developments. For the time being, your child's data will be handled in the same manner as previously and in accordance with legal principles. In the meantime, we thank you for your patience whilst we take the necessary steps set by the new legislation and guidance for handling data.

### LEADING EDGE

We are delighted to announce that we have been nationally recognised for exceptional performance in 2017-18. We have accepted an invitation to join the Leading Edge network, run by SSAT (the schools, students and teachers network).

Membership of this national network is by invitation only; this follows an in-depth analysis of national attainment data from the Department of Education and Ofsted. It is exclusively available to schools that are consistently high-performing.

Current data shows that boys at Isleworth & Syon are performing well beyond boys locally or nationally, with progress data for boys being in the top 5% of schools nationally. Read more [here](#).

## Developments

### BD ARCHITECTURAL CLIENT OF THE YEAR 2018 - NOMINATION

We have worked tirelessly to ensure that all improvements to the school estate are designed for the long-term and carried out in sympathy with our current building stock, whilst also acknowledging that we are located in a conservation area. This extends from fencing to other minor developments and of course major projects like the new teaching block. We have worked with our architects, Useful Studio, for a number of years now to improve the school estate.

In recognition of our work we were recently shortlisted for the BD Architectural Client of the Year Awards for 2018. The shortlisted clients were:

Stanhope - a property developer, whose recent works included work on Finsbury Circus (London) and the repurposing of the BBC Television Centre in White City.  
London Borough of Southwark Education Department for their work on high quality architecture in their schools.

Arrant Land - a developer focused on some prestigious new housing units.  
Sports Scotland - for delivering excellent sporting facilities across Scotland.

The judges said, "Headteacher Euan Ferguson has championed good design through a number of improvements to this boys' school in the London Borough of Hounslow. These include an extensive refurbishment of the humanities wing of 12 classrooms and social spaces, completed in 2014, plus a new standalone building to accommodate growing pupil numbers. Both projects are designed by Useful Studio, which is also drawing up designs for the refurbishment of the Art and DT block."

The awards ceremony was held at the Westminster Plaza Hotel in mid-April, hosted by TV presenter, Mark Durden-Smith. The London Borough of Southwark were the eventual winners of the category. It was, however, very rewarding to be on such prestigious short-list and is recognition for our strategy and recognition for the work of our architectural team.

### NEW TEACHING BLOCK

The new teaching block is, at last, nearing completion. We expect to be moving into the new premises during the summer holiday, so that the brand new facilities can be used for lessons next term.

The new rooms will be equipped to ensure the very best teaching and learning environment. They will have state-of-the art touchscreen technology, carefully controlled under-floor heating and a ventilation system to ensure the very best air quality at all times. The block will house English and mathematics classes.

### ART & DESIGN TECHNOLOGY BLOCK

The windows and doors in the Art & DT Block are now being replaced. This is the second phase of improvements to the facility and will mean that the rooms will retain the excellent natural light that the design affords, but the new technology glazing units will vastly improve the thermal behaviour of the building. This work will be completed during the summer holidays.

### NEW SCIENCE LABORATORIES

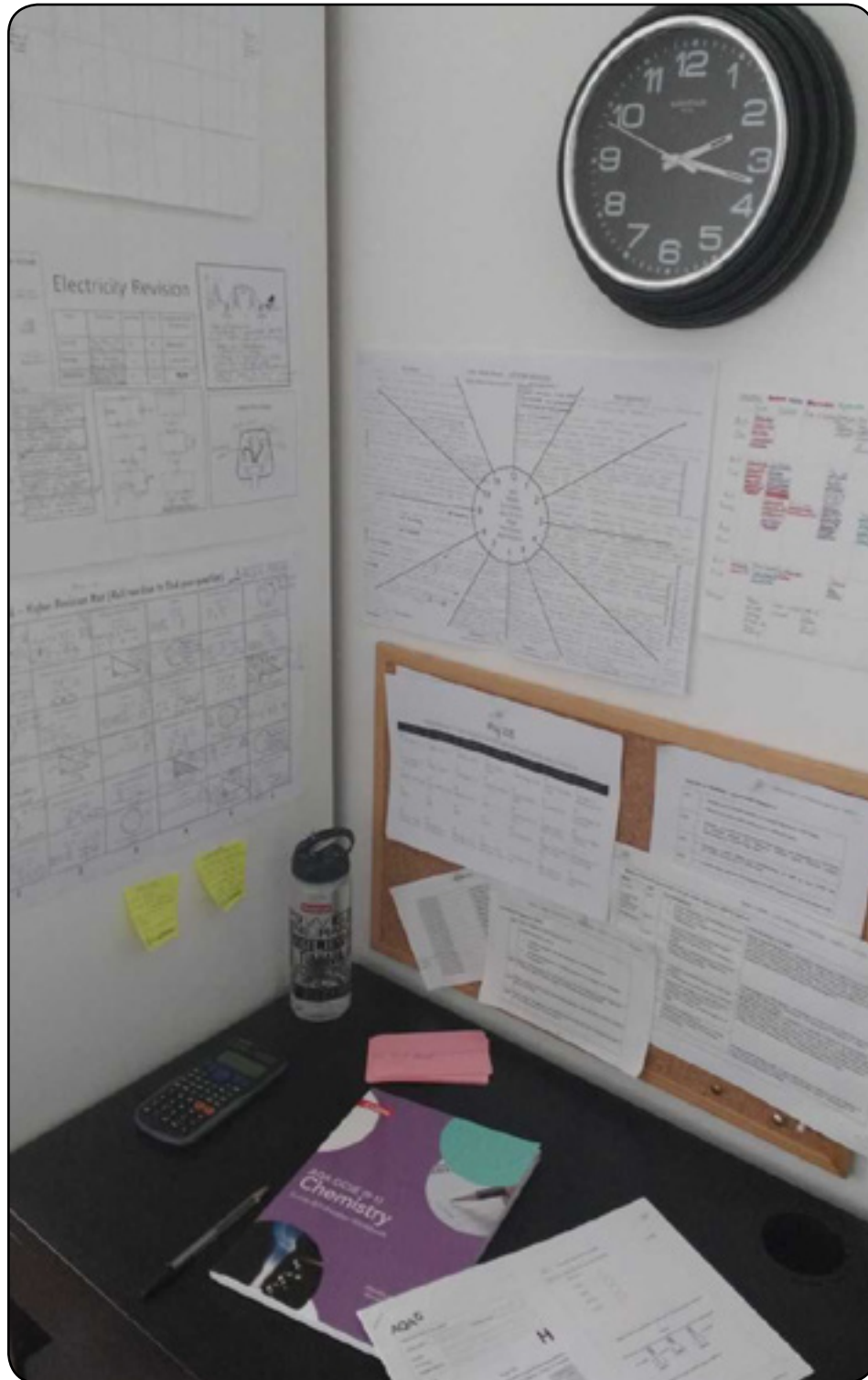

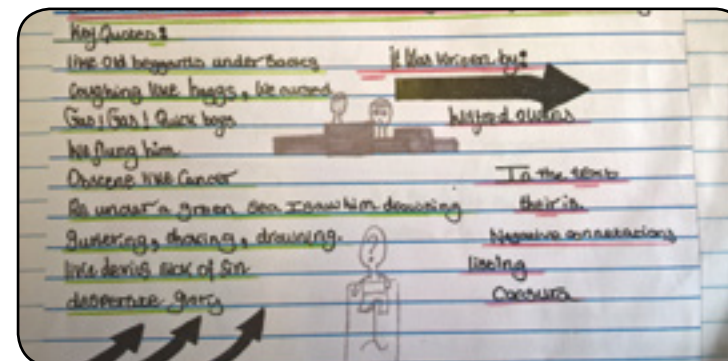
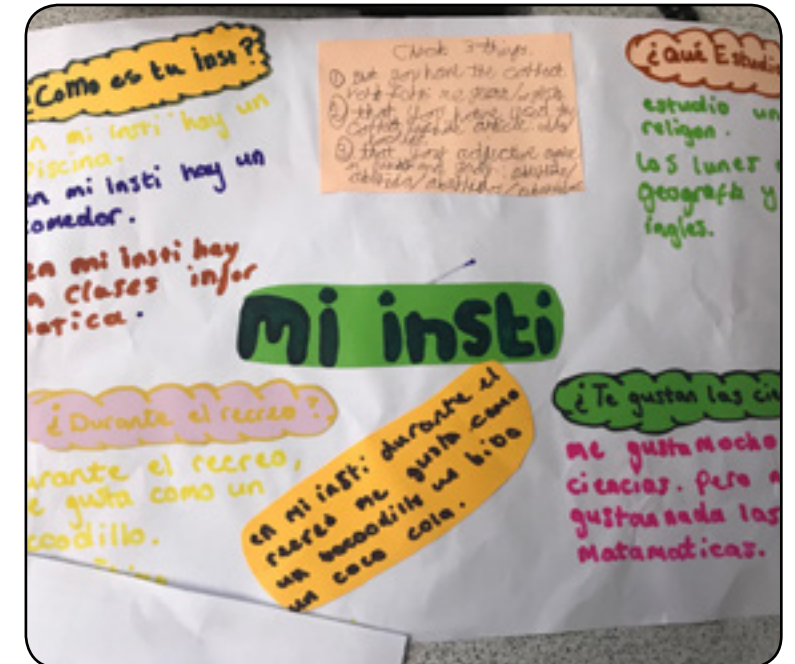
