- 1: Serious and very important; affecting the most central and important parts of something
- 2: central; forming the necessary basis of something

fundamental

Used in a sentence:

- *the fundamental principles of scientific method*
- *You have a fundamental right to privacy.*
- *a fundamental question/problem/issue*
- *a question of fundamental importance*
- *This principle is absolutely fundamental.*

Etymology and historical meaning of the term fundamental:

late Middle English: from French *fondamental*, or late Latin *fundamentalis*, from Latin *fundamentum*, from *fundare* 'to found'.

Different ways to use the word:

Verbs: be, seem, remain

Adverbs: really, truly, very

Preposition: to, for
